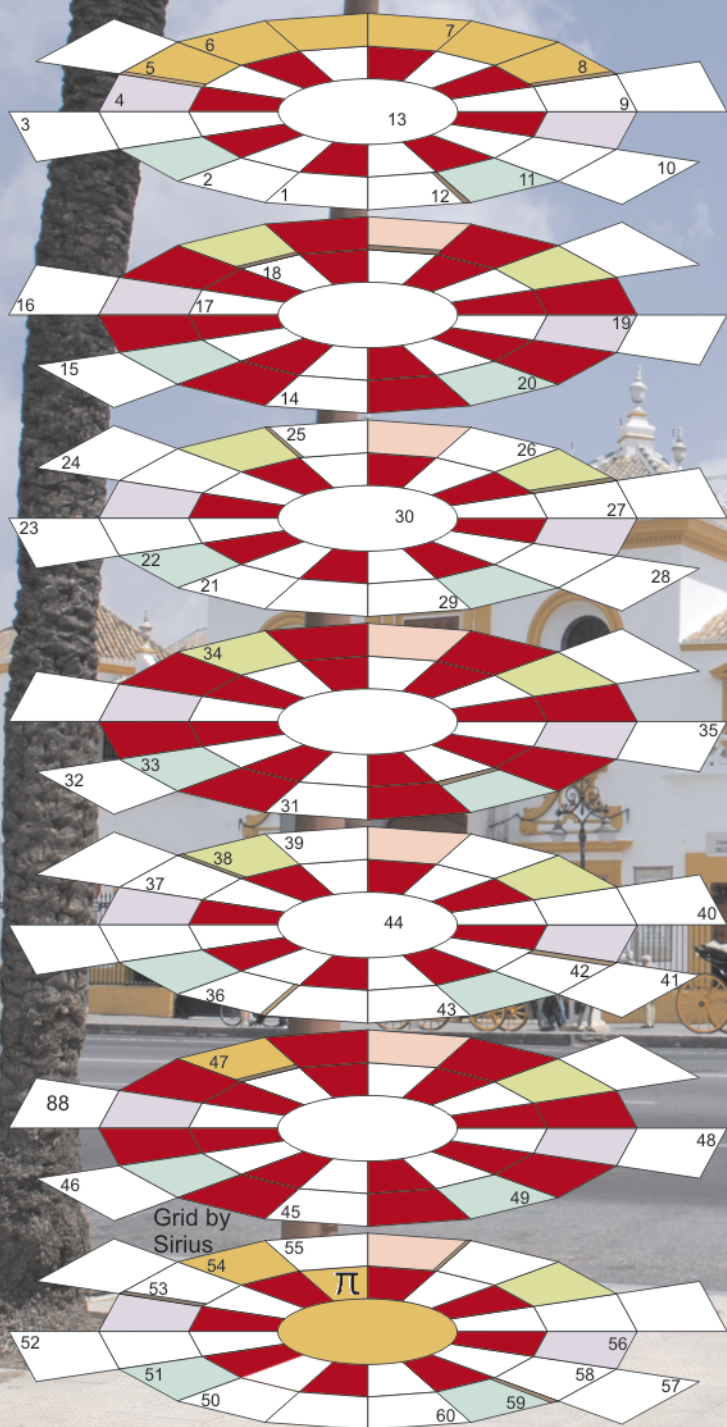


March 2017 Sirius



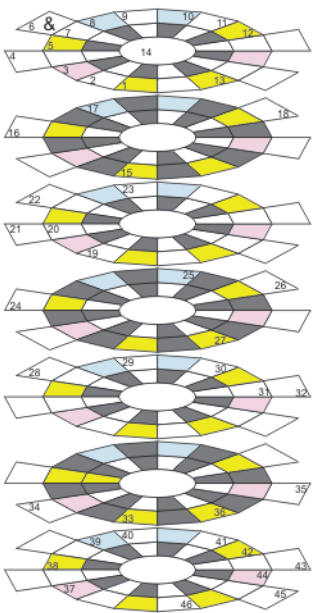
Noting a 142nd anniversary in six orange cells in the top dial. Fourteen solutions, in seven pairs, belong to two partially related thematic sets indicated by highlighted clues. Six asterisked clues have solutions which do not fit the grid, but their complement does. An anagram of all ten orange highlighted cells in the grid forms a title linking three solutions. Clues are presented in alphabetical order of their grid entries.

Sources of words

The primary source for words in our solutions is The Chambers Standard Reference Dictionary. After this the online One Look Dictionary is used. This is a large collection of different dictionaries that does not include Chambers. It is always possible to Google our words. Both the on-line Chambers Word Wizard and One Look Dictionary have partial word searches where you can enter incomplete words and see what other words fit the pattern. This is very useful, particularly with more obscure words.

When a word is not found in Chambers we try to indicate this by the side of the clue. You will see occasional yellow tags which indicate the source when it is something other than Chambers. This does not apply to proper nouns. Names of people and places etc do not require a source to be given. They will often relate to the theme of a puzzle where solvers will enjoy doing some research.



The March ‘Seven Dials’ Puzzle

Clues directed di are diametric and run from the number indicated on one side of a dial through the centre to the other side of the dial. Clues directed C are circular, running from the number around the dial in a clockwise direction. On occasions, antiC indicates an anti-clockwise direction. Clues directed d have conventional down solutions. Those directed ‘up’ start from a number at the bottom and run upwards. When a solution contains unrelated words, their clues are separated with a colon and have separate indications of number of letters. In a similar way the September puzzle has clockwise and anti-clockwise solutions, labelled C and aC respectively.

Alphabetical order

Usually puzzles are presented with clues in alphabetical order of their solutions. The order is judged by the **first word** in the solution.
